## Dealing with Time

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### WAKE UP!

1. Deal 7 cards to each player and put the rest face down in the centre.
2. (Jun) chooses a card from his hand (eg "Val/doing karate") and asks "(Aoi). When does/is Val finish .../giving ...?" Aoi answers "She finishes/She's giving ..." and hands over the card or "I don't know. WAKE UP!" and Jun takes a card from the deck. In both cases play passes to the next player.
3. Any set of 2 cards is laid face up and the sentence/s are read. The game ends when a player has no more cards at the start of his play. Cards on the table can be counted as points and cards in your hand as minus points if desired. Keep the game going by giving the winner a bonus card upon his turn. Use fewer cards (sets) to shorten the game.

## Wake Up!: Dealing with Time Cards

This Go Fish! style card game contains 60 different cards, separated into 15 characters, which focus on everyday activities and near future plans. Every card has a picture, a descriptive sentence and 3 phrases which the students use to form “When is ... ing ...?” questions for near future and “When does ... ..?” questions for everyday activities. Again, for a faster smoother game collect only pairs of cards and leave all cards that have been used face up on the table whether they have been answered in the affirmative or not. (1,200 yen)

Get a Country and Dealing with Sounds have similar layouts.
